Finance basics for Crown land managers

Improve your capability in financial management of Crown reserves by taking part in this course, which covers:

- Financial roles and responsibilities of Crown land managers
- Working within the structure and legislation of Crown Lands
- Cash-flow statements
- Financial oversight and monitoring
- Understanding financial statements



Better meetings, decision-making and conflict resolution

Learn more about the legal and regulatory context that you operate in as a Crown land manager. This course will provide insight into the specific board member roles of a statutory land manager including the functions of the Chairperson, Treasurer, Secretary and general board members. You'll also gain skills for running better meetings, decision-making, managing conflicts of interest and resolving conflict.



Creating a funding framework for Crown land managers

Find out how to secure funding for Crown reserves and get the maximum return on your fundraising efforts. The course will take you through the '7 pillars of funding,' which provide a good foundation for your funding strategy. You'll also receive resources to ensure you're well-prepared to develop a funding framework.



Licences and leases on Crown land

Licences and leases are essential tools for managing activities on Crown land and raising revenue to support the maintenance and management of reserve assets. Once you have completed this module you will understand:

- Definitions and key terms
- Principles of granting tenure on Crown reserves
- Licence and lease types
- Benefits of licences and leases
- Stakeholders and their roles
- How to select the most appropriate tenants
- Determining market rent and rental subsidies



Sustainable Crown reserves

As Crown land managers, you can help to enhance the public value of Crown land for the community and safeguard reserves for generations to come. Throughout this module you will develop a draft Environmental Sustainability Plan, to demonstrate your commitment to delivering positive environmental outcomes on your reserve. The course will cover:

- What environmental challenges do we face?
- How is the government responding?
- How can Crown land managers respond?
- Creating a culture of change
